1. Wrong Turn

4. Gateway Reflection

5. Seadwelling



In my artwork, I often create metaphorical entrances and exits. I look to create a narrative to open portals in which we can view parallels between the archaic and the modern. In my portrait Seadwelling, the ocean becomes both an entrance and exit into the fantastical to tell the tale of the heroine of the water.

Women have been said to have brought bad luck on board ships, yet women have been the best commanders and conquerors of the oceans in our histories. These legacies clash. I believe women and the sea have a kinship that we should honour. Through portraiture, I wish to depict this kinship that defies man-made labels.

6. Trapped in my mind



My artwork represents how I feel on a daily basis and embodies my interpretation of the theme, "EVERY EXIT IS AN ENTRY TO SOMEWHERE ELSE." For me, it represents the phenomenon of every choice made leading to a different door of outcomes and possibilities. The feeling of being trapped in life comes into play too as escaping life and taking the exit from living, is an entry into mind games which may wreak havoc on those who engage. The girl in the image feels trapped between being locked in her mind prison, or engaging in the outside world. Every choice, or exit, she makes leads her to enter new places which can be beautiful or utterly detrimental. She doesn't know what to do and feels lost and out of touch with life and reality and the fuzzy haze over her body is representative of this.

7. The entrance to a new beginning



This is a simple piece. It's about a person walking through a tunnel and it gets very dark quickly. Only a small light guides this person to the end of the tunnel. Then finally, this person can see light at the end of the tunnel and keeps walking.



It is a truth universally acknowledged that "every exit is an entry to somewhere new," and this artwork is a quintessential depiction of this. It is also an acknowledgment of the various unique meanings the statement beholds to the artist. The figure in the image is depicted wearing earphones - this is somewhat a self-portrait as music has always guided me through the challenges of life.

9. Pinkish Hell



I wanted to include both an entrance and exit if possible and ended up thinking that The Observatory Bar would be an interesting choice, with all the atmospheric gloomy lighting. But, also shoot it in a way that gives the viewer a choice, do they take the stairway up to "Heaven" or take the lift down to some kind of hellish secret underground society.

10. Presence in Absence



"Presence in Absence" is a photograph I took last year in response to the loneliness and solitude experienced during the pandemic. While no human presence is directly evident in the scene, the open door on the left of the building is evidence of life, evidence of the presence in the absence. The image serves as a reminder that around every corner is an open entrance - or exit - that promises to take us out of a pessimistic present into the hope and fear of an unknown future. Every decision we make opens and closes the sliding doors of our lives; each entrance or exit we take has the potential for radical change, opening new doorways that take our lives in a completely different direction from what we'd envisaged. The only certainty is uncertainty, so we exit through these doorways seeking fulfilment, seeking the presence in the absence.
