Partly through British influence it metamorphosed into Art Deco - the style that defined the jazz era and the golden age of pre-war Hollywood musicals. Art Deco pervaded all forms of design in a way that Art Nouveau never did, and in this talk, Ian will look at all aspects of design, not just architecture, and examine the influences still influential today. He will end with a round-up of some of the many surviving Art Deco buildings around the world.
