## ANNA MOSZYNSKA <u>Fresh Encounters: Contemporary Sculpture and the</u> <u>Public Space</u>

The role of sculpture has changed substantially in recent times. Here, I consider how the concept of monument and memorial, familiar since classical antiquity, shifts towards other concerns. I discuss how sculpture now plays a vitally important role in terms of site in the city; how the sculpture park comes into being in Britain in the mid-20th century, thanks to the efforts of Henry Moore, and grows exponentially across the globe; how water has attracted artists to make exceptional works in or alongside it; and not least, how sculpture has become a challenging and exciting space for social encounter. Among others, I include Tracey Emin, Antony Gormley, Anish Kapoor, Richard Long, Claus Oldenburg, Cornelia Parker & Rachel Whiteread - artists who also feature in my book, *Sculpture Now*.



Anna is a London-based lecturer and writer specialising in contemporary art. During the 1990s, Anna oversaw the development of subject as the first Master's Degree at Sotheby's Institute. She has also taught at institutions including The City Lit, the Royal Academy and Tate London, as well as lectured in cities ranging from Dubai to New York. Anna currently teaches at academic institutions in London and Paris and runs her own courses. Anna's books include *Abstract Art* (1990, enlarged ed. 2020) and *Sculpture Now* (2013), both published by Thames & Hudson. She enjoys introducing art to audiences in a lively and approachable way to make modern and contemporary art both accessible and interesting.

## DAVID BANNEY **Seeing Music, Hearing Art**





Described by pianist Roger Woodward as 'quite simply one of the best conductors in the country', David is one of Australia's most highly regarded musicians, with success as a conductor, composer, string player and educator. A past winner of the ABC Young Conductor's Award, the ABC Young Composers' Competition, and the North Queensland Concerto Competition, David is the Artistic Director of the Christ Church Camerata and the Newcastle Music Festival, and was recently appointed as Interim Music Director of Christ Church Cathedral Newcastle. David has worked with many of Australia's leading orchestras and soloists, including the Queensland, Adelaide and West Australian Symphony Orchestras, Opera Queensland, and soloists William Barton, Simon Tedeschi, Roger Woodward, Tamara Anna Cislowska and Andrew Blanch.

#### 'Seeing Music, Hearing Art'

Leonardo and Palestrina, Picasso and Stravinsky, Debussy and Matisse – art and music are never produced in a vacuum, and the histories of art and of music have run similar courses, with music always a little way behind. This lecture traces the major historical movements of the last 1000 years, exploring the parallels between sound and visual images. How can we 'hear' perspective? How can we 'see' sonata form? What does Rothko sound like, and what does Philip Glass look like? And why does music always take longer to catch up?

David is new to the Australian lecturers list and his lecture promises to be a real treat – grand piano and all!

## IAN GLEDHILL Art Nouveau Architecture Around the World

lan Gledhill has had a very varied career, from designing underground railways as an engineer for London Transport, to appearing in pantomime with Julian Clary. In between he has worked in travel and tourism, music publishing, television, and especially the theatre, where he has been an actor, director, set designer, stage manager and opera translator. His main interests include architecture, history, transport and classical music, especially opera and operetta, and these are reflected in the wide-ranging list of subjects for his lectures. He began giving lectures in 1997, and now gives on average around 75 a year.



This lecture looks at the influence of Art Nouveau style had on architecture in countries around the world, including Britain, Austria, Spain, Latvia and America. Despite the fact that Art Nouveau was originally largely inspired by British designers, the style found little favour in the UK. While French and Belgian architects used plant forms to create organic three-dimensional forms, Austrian Art Nouveau is surprisingly flat, and in Barcelona Antoni Gaudi's buildings seem much more based on animal shapes than plants. The city with more Art Nouveau buildings than any other is Riga in Latvia, where carved stone is much more prominent than the fantastical iron shapes found in Belgium or France. We finish our world tour in America, with the elaborately decorated designs of Louis Tiffany and Louis Sullivan.

#### FLAPPERS, SPEEDOS AND THE NEW LOOK - FASHION IN AUSTRALIA IN THE 20s, 30s AND 40s

In the 1920s there wasn't an Australian style in women's dress. Almost overnight, the arrival of an economic depression brought a serious tone to society. Women's hemlines dropped, and the carefree age of the flapper was over. By the time Australia entered the Second World War, rationing was brought in and women were taught to make 'New Clothes from Old' and 'Make Do and Mend'. By 1947 Christian Dior's New Look had restored femininity to both the fashion industry and women worldwide. In Sydney local designers Beril Jents and Hall Ludlow were quietly paving the way for an Australian look and the beginnings of the Australian fashion industry. Join Claudia Chan Shaw to discover the story of fashion in Australia from the twenties through to the forties.
