1. The Nature with the Lens Ball



This is a photo of my lens ball sitting on a grey rock with some yellow moss on the rock. The lens ball is the main subject in this image followed by the rock that the lens ball is sitting on. In the background, there is some blurry water with some even more blurry boats with the weather being mostly cloudy.

2. Isle of Forests



The artwork is a way to set down the flashes and heavy amount of equipment and use different mediums.

3. Exploration



On the weekends I go to the botanical gardens and sit under a tree, then wait for my subjects to crawl to me (or more accurately, crawl ON me). This little caterpillar came along just as I was getting ready to leave. He wasn't very happy getting picked up, but he did turn out to be a good poser.

4. Flowing Cloud



My photograph was taken just after sunset on kunanyi. It is a long exposure of a cloud inversion, smoothing out the slow-moving cloud into a soft, ocean-like mist. Cloud inversions occasionally form on the mountain when cold air is trapped beneath a layer of still, warm air. It is incredible to be up there when one is happening, as the world below often completely disappears and the temperature is surprisingly pleasant for the altitude. Taking my photograph after sunset gave the image a strong colour contrast between the still-glowing warmth of the sky and the deep, cool shadows. The ridge-line barely peaks out from the sea of cloud, and stands out darkly against the pastel clouds.

5. A Big Little World



This work is a micro view of moss found at Snug Falls. the upward angle imitates a sheer cliff wall whist the lighting highlights the details and various colours of the moss. I choose moss as my subject due to its importance to ecosystems across the world, as it, like trees, is capable of converting carbon into breathable oxygen. some kinds of moss have been found to be even more effect at this than trees. Moss is a beautiful part of our landscape in Tasmania, with a wide variety of shape, detail and colour, as well as a critical part of our ecosystem.

6. A Hand Full of Nature



It's a race to find as water rips past me. A blur of green runs past, I snatch up as much colour as I can.

I hold up a hand, full of nature.
