LECTURER – ANNE ANDERSON

Anne is Honorary Associate Professor at Exeter University. With a first degree in archaeology and a PhD in English, Anne was a senior lecturer in Art and Design History at Southampton Solent University for 14 years. She has curated four national exhibitions and her book on *The Perseus Series* accompanied the Edward Burne-Jones exhibition (2018, Tate Britain). Anne has also published over a hundred academic papers and held several prestigious fellowships. Currently a guide and lecturer, Anne specialises in Arts and Crafts art tours. Her career as an international speaker has taken her all over the world.



BEAUTIFUL HOUSES:

Frank Lloyd Wright, America's Greatest Architect

Frank Lloyd Wright is best known for his Prairie houses, designed to blend with the flat terrain around Chicago.

Wright conceived his houses as 'total artworks' or 'gesamtkunstwerk'. The architect controlled the design of all fixtures and fittings including furniture and lights. Beautifully designed, Wright's work is also superbly made, falling under the heading of American Arts and Crafts. Many of his designs reflect the growing interest at the time, in Native American arts and crafts.

The first half of the 13th century in France saw the flowering of a spirituality that led to the construction of more than 40 great Gothic cathedrals. The geometry, patterns and proportional harmony used in the cathedral and its stained-glass window design was inspired by patterns in nature and used by each generation of architects and craftsmen as they sought to emulate God's Divine plan for the creation.
