Winner of ArtsNational Outstanding Conservation Prize, 2024

Vera Olbrycht is the winner of the 2023 AICCM/ArtsNational Outstanding Conservation Student.

Vera is a former student at the University of Canberra and a member of AICCM (Australian Institute for the Conservation of Cultural Material). She graduated from the University of Canberra at the end of 2023 and is now working in her chosen profession.

She achieved high academic grades and was an inquisitive and meticulous student with great potential in her bench skills.

Vera has an inquiring mind, is unafraid of asking questions and is keen to accept intellectual challenges in the lab and when engaging with fellow students.

She has demonstrated a strong commitment to conservation, is an active student member of the AICCM and has been involved in local ACT AICCM events.

Vera provided this report in support of her application to ArtsNational:

“My developing expertise as an object conservator is drawn from a lifetime of making, mending and restoring textiles, furniture, ceramics and tinkering with mechanical things.

The specialised conservation skills and knowledge gained at the University of Canberra built on my volunteer experience, cleaning and conserving historic houses and contents, and previous work in graphic design, photography, landscaping and picture framing.

Typically, my work involves cleaning large outdoor sculptures, with various remedial treatments done under magnification, designing and constructing archival storage boxes, environmental monitoring, and condition reporting.

It is a fusion of craft and materials science, with patience being the overall ingredient.

My current work as a Conservation Assistant with the Art Collections section at Australian Parliament House is all of this on a grand scale!”
