#### Raffle proceeds supports Young Arts

Buy a raffle ticket; it goes to a good cause! We use the proceeds from our raffle to support Young Arts in Canberra and to make a donation to the Patricia Robinson Fund, part of the Association of ArtsNational.

Each year the Patricia Robertson Fund, consistent with an agreement with the Australian Institute of Conservation of Cultural Materials, provides at least one Mid-Career Scholarship and two Outstanding Conservator Student Awards for students at the University of Canberra and the University of Melbourne.

For some years, we have been supporting young artists at Canberra Glassworks to attend masterclasses. The Glassworks offers professional workshops led by celebrated Australian artists to provide practicing artists a unique opportunity to develop techniques and expand their skills in the field of glass arts.



This year we are contributing \$3,000 to enable two young artists to attend a masterclass in glass blown replicas, led by Ben Edots. Ben is an Australian artist who has been blowing glass since 1987 and has travelled and worked in the United States, Japan and Italy. The five-day masterclass will explore the deep history of glass through the art of replication. Participants will study historical glass forms from various cultures and time periods, then attempt to replicate these objects using traditional and modern hot glass techniques.

The successful Glassworks artists will give a presentation at our AGM on 1 December 2025.

For our last two lectures this year, our raffle will include four (not three) prizes. You have one more chance to win, for the same ticket price! De Clavijo was a diplomat and he wrote this account of his 15<sup>th</sup> century journey to the court of Timur in Samarkand. The descriptions of the people, landscapes, and customs he encountered will no doubt remind readers of Chris Aslan's own experience and story.



The Mistress of Menace and the Master of Suspense

Presented by John Francis

Venue & Time: Tuesday 23 September 2025, National Library of Australia, 6pm.



John is an inspirational speaker who has delivered lecturers and workshops in the US, Beijing, Malaysia and the UK. Trained as a painter, John was awarded the Max Beckmann Memorial Scholarship in painting in Brooklyn, New York and went on to be artist in residence for

the state of Texas. Later, John produced and directed several short films and animations. He has taught film, art and pedagogy at universities in the UK, US and Malaysia.

#### The Treasures of Tanis

#### Presented by Eileen Goulding

In 1939–1940 in the ancient Egyptian city of Tanis in the Nile Delta, French Egyptologist Pierre Montet discovered a complex of royal tombs— three were still intact! The treasures uncovered constitute one of the greatest, and most beautiful, archaeological discoveries, rivalling even those of Tutankhamun. But because its discovery was during World War II and as it was published only in French, it went unnoticed. This lecture covers the discovery of the tombs of the pharaohs Psusennes I, Sheshonq II, and Amenope with the gold and silver treasures, fine jewellery and artefacts now housed in Cairo's Egyptian Museum.

Eileen has an MA in archaeology from the University of London. She specialises in the history and culture of the ancient worlds of the Mediterranean, South America and Australasia. While continuing her research, Eileen gives lectures to The Arts Society and other organisations. Her first book, What Did the Poor Take with Them, is a treatise on ancient Egyptian funerary goods, while her second book, Understanding Ancient Egypt, is a good introduction to the subject.

# Did you know? The difference between lectures and Special Interest Mornings

If you enjoy the ArtsNational lectures, but have not attended a Special Interest Morning (SIM), we encourage you to do so. The SIM is not a repeat of the lecture but offers different lectures in the lecturer's area of knowledge. What's more, the lecturer delivers two presentations at the SIM; twice as good as the lecture night!

Each year for the annual membership fee, ArtsNational Canberra offers lectures from six international and two Australian lecturers with diverse expertise across the arts. In addition to this core lecture program, we usually offer two SIMs during the year.

The Committee selects the SIMs by identifying two lecturers from the annual lecture program who offer such an interesting range of topics, that it is worth asking the lecturer to present three lectures – one as part of the annual evening lecture program and a further two lectures



as a SIM. So while the subject matter may have a relationship, each of the lectures is a distinct topic.

SIMs are held at 10 am at 25 Forster Crescent in Yarralumla, the Wednesday morning after the Tuesday night lecture. A light and delicious morning tea is served between the two lectures. The cost to attend a SIM is a bargain price of \$65 for members and \$70 for non-members.

You may wish to get in early for Eileen Goulding's 22 October SIM.

Eileen will be speaking on:

• Mesoamerican Pyramids -- Tombs or Temples

Colossal pyramids are scattered across Mesoamerica but are they the same as those built by ancient Egyptians? Eileen will take you on a tour of several pyramid sites, including Teotihuacan and Chichen Itza, to compare their function and design and identify the people who built them and the artefacts they left behind.

Aztec and Maya Civilisations of Mexico

Human hearts, blood and children's tears were all necessary to quench the hunger of the bloodthirsty gods of Mexico. If their needs were not satisfied the consequences for the nation would be catastrophic. In this lecture we discover some of their ancient gods and learn about the religious rites designed to appease them.

Canberra Glassworks, 21 Aug to 26 Oct 2025

Artist and designer Will Lynes presents a solo exhibition, Oily Water, which delves into the tension between precision and imperfection.

Will Lynes explores the historical and artistic relationship between glass and painted lettering, rooted in traditional signwriting techniques such as reverse glass painting and gilding, blending art and advertising.







A classically trained gilder, Will investigates the tension between precision and imperfection in his practice. By allowing materials to express their natural qualities, he moves beyond the constraints of traditional methods, exploring new approaches and unlocking the potential of his refined skills. Will's work emphasises the sensory experience of materials and the dialogue between process, craftsmanship and artistic expression as he develops his unique creative voice.


