Is it the merry couple enjoying wine and music, the elegant furnishings, or is it the light and shadow which suffuses every detail and creates the tonal nuances of his compositions? Vermeer's art will be reviewed as will the circumstances that may have influenced him

Degenerates and Perverts: The Legendary 1939 Herald Exhibition Presented by by Steven Miller *




The 1939 Herald Exhibition of French and British Contemporary Art has been called the single most enlivening event in Australia's modern cultural development. Opening when Australia was undergoing profound change, this exhibition became the focus for the opposing forces of cultural conservatism and innovation.

This lecture will examine the many and competing claims made about the exhibition – how the show was organised, how it was displayed, and the reception it received. It will evaluate its impact upon Australian art and society, at a time when conservatives were accused of perverting progress and progressives were accused of degeneracy.

Who's Afraid of Ai Weiwei: Repression and Resistance in Recent Chinese Art

Presented by Barry Venning



When the Chinese authorities arrested Ai Weiwei in 2011, the graffiti artist, Tangerine (Tang Chen) stencilled his image, Banksy-like, thousands of times all over Hong Kong, with the question 'Who's afraid of Ai Weiwei?' Ai became the best-known symbol of resistance to Chinese repression, but many of his friends and peers also risked the wrath of the Chinese state. In addition to Ai himself, the lecture examines the coded resistance of Ai's friends in the Beijing East Village art community.

Pompeii & Herculaneum: Reconstructing the Final Day Presented by James Renshaw



This presentation brings together archaeology, volcanology, literary evidence, and art to examine what happened to these two towns when destroyed on the same day in AD 79 by the eruption of Mt Vesuvius.

Those present will examine the evidence of Pliny the Younger, the provider history's first eyewitness account of a volcanic eruption, along with the evidence uncovered in the cities themselves.

The Use of Naturalism in the work of Fabergé

The name Fabergé conjures up images of pre-revolutionary Russia, opulent Easter eggs and exquisite pieces found in the most important collections in the world.

This presentation analyses the use of naturalism in the work of Fabergé, focusing on its lesser-known experiments in Art Nouveau, as well as animal representations in hardstone carvings and flower studies. It also highlights the naturalistic imagery incorporated into objects d'art such as desk seals and caviar dishes.
